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Terra, Grass River break ground on Grove Central project featuring Target at Metrorail Station

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Terra and Grass River Property have partnered to break ground on Grove Central, a mixed-use project at the Coconut Grove Metrorail station in Miami that will include a Target store.

The Miami-based developers, through GRP Grove Metro Station, leased the 5-acre site near the public transit station at 2780 S.W. 27th Ave. from Miami-Dade County for 90 years. The 23-story project will consist of 402 apartments, 170,000 square feet of retail, and a 1,250-space public parking garage.

Target leased 50,000 square feet of retail there, which will make this the closest Target to the popular Coconut Grove neighborhood.

"Terra is focused on advancing a sustainable and resilient development model that combines residential density, a balanced mix of commercial uses, and access to multimodal transit options," CEO <u>David Martin</u> said. "Grove Central will bring this vision to life along one of Miami's most important transit corridors, creating an everyday amenity for nearby residents and filling a void in our housing market."

In addition to being at a public transition station connected to major employment centers such as downtown Miami, the University of Miami, and Miami International Airport, the project will be along the Underline, a linear park under development.

Grove Central will include workforce housing and co-living units. The developer will contribute about \$5 million in improvements to the Metrorail station.

"Grove Central is a model for the future of development and mobility in Miami-Dade County," Miami-Dade County Mayor Daniella Levine Cava said. "Creating a more sustainable, resilient community means getting people out of their cars, making transit more accessible, and creating new workforce housing opportunities."

<u>Touzet Studio</u> designed Grove Central. The general contractor is Juneau Construction. The developers expect to obtain a construction loan soon. The project should be completed in 2023.

It will be built to the Gold-level National Green Building Standard, with features such as water-resilient plants to absorb stormwater and a large cistern to capture water runoff from the roof.

"Together with our partners at Miami-Dade County, we believe that locating mixed-use amenities at transit hubs will increase ridership on public transportation and help alleviate reliance on cars," Grass River Property President Peter LaPointe said.

Miami-Dade has fostered many transit-oriented development projects at Metrorail stations to boost ridership and offer riders more shopping options.

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
